

PROGRAM

Our September program will be a trunk show by Dorothy Scalice, quilting teacher par excellence. Dorothy is a popular and respected teacher at City Quilter. She has taught classes at Empire as well.

I have found universal praise for her among fellow quilters. I do not recall that we have ever seen her body of work in a single trunk show. So, I think this will be an enjoyable presentation for everyone.

Dorothy Scalice is an incredibly versatile quiltmaker and an entertaining and effective teacher. She has taught many classes at the City Quilter, and has also led workshops for our guild. Her recent class titles include *Clever Curves, Free Wheeling, Irish Rose Chain and Barcelona Nights.*

In each of her classes, Dorothy takes standard quilting elements or techniques and demonstrates a new slant. Sometimes it is an easier way to accomplish a difficult task or sometimes it is a totally new use for a traditional technique.

This should be a wonderful presentation to start the new Empire year.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello everyone, and welcome to the start of another season for Empire Quilters. I'm proud and excited to be accepting leadership of the Guild for the next two seasons, and I hope that as a group we'll find our time together inspiring, informative, wonderfully sociable and, of course, fun.

Considering what to write in my first message to you, and what to say at our first fall meeting put me in mind of my first quilting experiences. My Grandma was a prolific quilter. I remember that she made quilts for all 20 grandchildren – both for use on our beds as we grew up, and also special wedding quilts – Mom would take these from the cedar chest once a year to show us what we'd be getting. As occasion required, Grandma would quickly make a quilt to take to college.

My Grandma taught me to quilt when I was 6 or 7 years old. We lived in Massachusetts, but Grandma was in Pennsylvania – so when we visited, I'd spend as much time with her as I could. I always played about in her scraps bag, and wanted her to make something for my dolly. Instead, she told me I should learn to make my own quilts and doll clothes. I was so excited – I felt special and grown up. While she cooked delicious Pennsylvania Dutch meals, I sat nearby cutting and sewing – by hand of course.

Being a 'fabric-aholic' even then, I was most excited by having lots of choices of material – Grandma had to rein in my inclinations to include everything I liked in one piece. My first quilt had blue and yellow and pink patches set with muslin. My first stitches were pretty big, and I was a little embarrassed to show Grandma – her stitches seemed impossibly tiny to me. But she was very kind and re-assured me that my work was good for a beginner, and with practice I'd get better. She encouraged and supported me over the years as I continued to sew. (**cont. pg 3**)

CATHY HOOVER'S VEST WORKSHOP

One by one, excited women poked their heads up the stairs at Sonny Rieber's house and stepped into a large, sunlit room full of fabric swatches and tables. Months of waiting for Cathie Hoover's vest workshop were over; today was the day. Each class member lugged her sewing machine up the stairs and pulled piles of fabric out of bags, totes and carry-alls. Cathie Hoover introduced herself, and the two-day workshop began.

Cathie brought several of her vests to class, each more beautiful than the last. She measured each class member, explained how to construct a muslin pattern, and had each of us make a paper pattern from that. Once our basic vest pieces were cut, we moved into color and pattern. Piping, ½-square triangles, reverse appliqué; Cathie demonstrated each technique that enriched her vests, and showed us methods for making sharp corners or close cuts. Some of us were still trying to decide on which fabrics to use, while Cathie amazed us with her command of each technique.

Cathie Hoover has an easy teaching manner. She is lighthearted, fun and quick. A look here, a comment there and she turns a so-so fabric choice into something vibrant, or conversely, something subtle. The joy of a workshop such as this is that we all began in the same place, but little by little our talented class created individual variations on a theme. Finally, Cathie's grateful class packed their projects, unplugged their machines and trudged their materials back down the stairs, happy, relaxed and invigorated by a wonderful weekend with a gracious hostess and a talented artist. 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

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LIBRARY NEWS

We hope everyone had a great summer and spent a lot of time quilting. The library book sale raised a substantial amount, thanks to the generosity of our members, for our Empire Show. We have added some of the donations to the library collection as well as some purchases. We would also like to have recommendations for books of special interest. If you plan to enter work for the Show and need books on design or theory please let us know. The world of quilting is expanding rapidly with new techniques in machine work, new materials for enhancing stitching design, and the impulse to creative design rather than pattern work and the Library should be a resource for our members.

Thanks to the donation of current magazines these new areas can be looked at before spending the dollars to add them to our home library.

Some of the books we will be bringing to the meeting in September are *Embroidery Techniques From East and West* by Munni Srivastava (Trafalgar Publications, 2001), a beautiful book of

design and techniques to enhance surface textures, and creating layouts that are dynamic but simple. There is information on the history and meaning of the symbols, and on the uses of layering lightweight fabrics. Two great pieces are a wall hanging of Tumbling Blocks in silk and an architectural design that is perfect for batiks.

Quilt Artistry—Inspired Designs from the East (Kodansha, 2002) is the design work and creative theory of Japanese quilt maker Yashiko Jinzenji. This is not a how-to make a block book but one that shows her creative path from making quilts using standard American style work, incorporating Amish work, then adding the culture and fabrics of Japan, learning dying techniques from Bali, and then developing stitching that finishes the piece. Ms Jinzenji was a guest of Japan Express last year where she displayed her work.

MESSAGE FROM THE PROGRAM CHAIR ROOM ARRANGEMENT

Those of you who attended the June meeting will recall that we tried out a new seating arrangement. October 2005 Block of the Month - Robbing Peter to Pay Paul

This block is one that was used by pioneer women who used every little scrap of fabric. Their life was hard and fabric was not only costly but not very available. Following my directions you will make two blocks that mirror each other.

- 1. Cut a 10 inch square from plastic or cardboard.. Choose two fabrics that go together, perhaps one medium or dark and one light so there will be contrast.
- 2. Cut an isosceles triangle with 4 inch sides from opposite corners of the square. (An isosceles triangle has two matching sides).
- 3. You now have two templates one for the main fabric and one for the corner fabric
- 4. Cut one center piece and two corner pieces from each fabric.
- 5. Sew the corners of fabric 1 to the corner of fabric 2 and vice versa (see picture).
- 6. If you have a problem, see me at the September 10th meeting. Leila Lieberman

WORKSHOP SUPPLY LIST:

Stars: 3 contrasting Halloween fat quarters. **Pumpkins:** 2 or 3 12" squares of orangey flannels/cottons scrap. **Cat:** 12" square black solid or figured cotton scrap.

Background and batting - 1 YD each. **Optional:** Borders and binding – scraps or ½ yds. Rick-rac or bias binding. **SEWING SUPPLIES:** Sewing Machine,*Rotary Cutter/Mat/Ruler (6"x24")*, Iron and Ironing Mat, *Scissors*, Thread to match fabric, *Pins*. **Optional:** Double Fuse Sheets. If you can not bring a machine, all techniques will be demonstrated for you to sew at home.
