PROGRAM

Cassandra Thoreson is a native New Yorker with no family tradition of quilting. Her quilting life really began in 1990 when Mennonite friends in central Pennsylvania showed her the basics of machine piecing and hand quilting. She has been teaching since 1994-almost exclusively handwork. From the beginning, her interest has centered on quilt history and the stories behind old quilts. Cassandra's interest in Welsh quilting was spurred by one of the first quilt books she owned, which had pictures of antique Welsh quilts. She first tried her hand at whole cloth quilting in the late 90s and then began collecting Welsh quilts. She has taught

appliqué, hand quilting, hand piecing as well as color and design classes at various shops in New York City. Currently the mother of a college freshman, she looks forward to having more time (and space) for her work.

Welsh whole cloth quilts have a fascinating tradition that includes quilts made by home sewers for personal use as well as those made by itinerant quiltmakers. Both visually stunning and humble, they have connections to similar styles of quilt making in northern England, but they have a freedom of design that is all their own. Quilted with large stitches in bold

patterns, the thick and very warm wool-filled quilts were originally made for private use, but in the first third of the 20th century, they began to be produced for sale as a source of income for local women-mostly in economically depressed mining communities. Throwing the fancy, white, delicately stitched whole cloth quilting traditions that most Americans are familiar with on its head, their spontaneity and undeniably striking designs stand the test of time. They have a lot to teach us about beauty and perfection, as well as history.

2007 QUILT SHOW UPDATE

With just two months to go to show time, I felt this was a good time to review what has happened with show preparation thus far and to remind the membership that it is time for you to claim participation by signing up for your volunteer commitments. Thus far the show committee and committee chairs have completed arrangements with FIT for show space and staffing for the show.

Important dates to remember:

January 13, 2007: (this is the date of our January meeting) Quilt Entry submission forms are due, including a color photo for each quilt being submitted, and the \$20.00 entry fee for up to two quilts. The photos will be used for color for appropriate show lay out. Your descriptions and measurements along with methods will be used for judging and program listing.

President's Challenge quilt submission forms due, and must include a color photo (no fee for this submission)

January 15, 2007: submission forms that are mailed in must be postmarked by this date to be accepted into the show.

January 31, 2007: Members' Boutique submission forms are due.

March 10, 2007: (date of our March meeting) Quilts to be judged should be brought to FIT in our regular meeting area between 8 and 10 AM and picked up at 5 PM.

March 23, 2007: Quilts to be hung in the show are to be delivered to FIT 28th Street entrance between 8 and 10 a.m.

March 25, 2007: Quilts from the show are to be picked up at FIT between 6 and 7 p.m.

Remaining Members' Boutique items are to be picked up by 5:30 PM.

The raffle quilt was completed and you have begun to sell raffle tickets. Thanks to those of you who have already turned in receipts; please continue with your sales effort. This is a principal source of funding for our show. The quilt is currently on tour in Connecticut and will be on display at Quilters Notion in January and at City Quilters February - prior to the show. Thanks to each of these vendors who are also going to sell raffle tickets while the quilt is being displayed.

Our promotional campaign began with post cards and flyers given out in the fall. The show is listed in Quilters' Newsletter in the January/February issue and will continue in the March issue. We have beautiful posters designed by Pat Decker. These are available in 8.5 x 11 format that can be printed from our web site (empirequilters.net) and distributed by members to shops and neighborhood stores. The full size 12 x 18 poster will be available at the January meeting.

Post cards are still be available and can be picked up at the January meeting along with a card version of our poster with directions to the show on the back.

Volunteers: Many of you signed up over the last year to help with the show. Leila Lieberman has consolidated the list and is coordinating with the various committees to determine their needs and ensure we have

enough volunteers to cover the roles. The following is a list of expected tasks that will be involved with each committee. I am listing them now in the event you might like to change to a more specific task. If you haven't signed up to volunteer yet, now is the time. Remember any member who submits a quilt for hanging is required to devote at least 4 hours of volunteer activity for the show. There is a similar expectation of any member who wishes to participate in members' boutique sales. Naturally, we also quite happy to have other members volunteer too – this show represents the best that our whole guild can present

Event volunteer activities include:

Set up and take down – frames will be assembled and quilts hung on the pre show day March 23, 2007, and will be taken down following the close of show on March 25, 2007. Staff is needed for check in of quilts on Friday morning and the claim of quilts on Sunday evening.

White-Glove Docents: During the show member volunteers will serve as white glove docents to be sure that no quilts are damaged or soiled.

Group sales and admissions— this committee will organize and follow up on group sales, which will be completed by March 10, 2007. The committee will prepare packages for the reserved groups to be presented upon their arrival. Volunteers will meet the bus and distribute the group's programs and admission wristbands. This committee will also man the admission desk for the daily admission sales.

Press and publicity – this committee will distribute posters after the January meeting. They will organize any press releases and potential interviews.

Members' Boutique - this is the place for you to sell those items you have made and make a little money for yourself and for the guild. Volunteers will be needed for set up and take down of the boutique and for sales on show

days. Members who submit items for sale will be expected to volunteer 4 hours in the boutique.

Quilt judging – Eugenia Barnes and Donna Lamb will be judging quilts on March 10, 2007 during the March meeting. Since this is an all day event, and members are asked to start delivering quilts by 9 a.m., in-take volunteers should plan to be at FIT by 8:30 a.m. Volunteers will be needed to assist with registration of quilts along with white glove showing of the quilts for the judges. This operation will be dome in the strictest confidence. Judging is expected to be a full-day event and currently we expect to need members available to help with the white glove activities until at least 5:00 p.m.

Quilt Appraisals - Eugenia Barnes will be conducting quilt appraisals at the show. Eugenia is one of the first five people certified by AQS as an Appraiser of Quilts/Quilted Textiles. Volunteers will be needed to assist in the checking and registration of quilt for appraisals. This will include collecting the fee for the appraisal.

Speakers: volunteers will be need for each speaker to assist in direction to the auditorium, set up with the projectionist and for white glove showing of quilts if necessary.



SPEAKERS FOR URBAN INSPIRATIONS

As your committee for speakers and programs for our 2007 Urban Inspirations Quilt Show, we have worked very hard to bring you speakers who will address both quilt history and its future.

We are going to start our program on Saturday, March 24 at 11:30 in the Auditorium with Lee Kogan from the American Folk Art Museum presenting a lecture/slide show on New York This lecture is drawn from the Beauties. Museum's show of the same name from several years ago and provides a fascinating social history of New York State as well as an appreciation of the wonderful quilts made during our history. Lee is the director of the American Folk Art Institute as well as a professor at New York University. Those of you who participate in the Folk Art Museum's Quilt day in October will know her for her enthusiasm and wit.

At 1:30 on Saturday, we will be presenting a lecture by Leslie Levison on the beginnings of the Empire Guild. Leslie, along with our own Anna Foss, is one of the Founding Mothers of the Guild, and its first President. She has some wonderful, funny stories to share with us.

On Sunday at 11:30, we will be presenting a lecture/slide show by Mickey Lawler-"Confessions of a Blanket Lady" which is a slide journey through 30 years in the life and career of a quilter. Skydyes, Mickey's business one of the earliest sellers of hand dyed fabrics. While she unfortunately cannot vend at our show, you should all take advantage of the opportunity to listen to her talk about her gorgeous fabrics and quilts.

We will wrap up our scheduled speakers at 1:30 on Sunday with Marilyn Henrion giving her lecture "Evolution of a Quiltmaker: The Seventh Decade." Marilyn, an Empire alumna, is a lifelong New Yorker and her quilts hang in museums, corporate and private collections worldwide. She has had numerous one woman shows at galleries in New York, the most recent this last October.

In addition, we will have an ongoing slide presentation on Empire Quilters first twenty five years. When you are exhausted from visiting all the wonderful quilts and vendors, take a few minutes to sit in the auditorium and enjoy our history.



QUILTER OF THE MONTH

Sylvia Zeveloff began sewing at age 13, making her own clothes. She made her first quilt, a "Grandmother's Garden Quilt", by hand, in the 1950's. About 1986 Sylvia went to Monticello, Mt. Vernon where she saw a brochure for a near-by quilt store. She visited and fell in love with the fabric. Sylvia has been quilting every since!

Initially, Sylvia produced numerous traditional quilts — everyone in her immediate family received one. Eventually she began designing her own quilts and Sylvia has been an art quilter ever since! She studied with Nancy Crow in 1987. Sylvia does mostly pieced quilts as well as some appliqué and likes embellishment too! In 1997 she had a quilt exhibited in Paducah! Sylvia was one of Empire's original quilters of the month.

Sylvia has also been painting since the 1960's – primarily water-color landscapes. She has taught water color painting at the New School, Institute for Retired Persons. Now and originally from New York, Sylvia has moved across the country four times.



FEBRUARY BLOCK OF THE MONTH

February Block-of-the-Month – Hot Hearts – Finishes at 6 inches


To make this block, you will need:

One 4-3/4 inch light blue square (note the unordinary size)
One 5-1/2 inch darker blue square cut twice diagonally to make 4 triangles



Sew one triangle to each side of the 4-3/4 inch light blue square This will give you a square within a square

Trace the heart on to any type of red fabric with or without a design in the fabric. Center it in the inner square. If you wish to hand appliqué this heart, add a quarter inch seam allowance. Otherwise machine stitch in place using a decorative stitch. Be sure to use a stabilizer underneath.



She will show how to look inward to translate a photograph into a creative and fun quilt! This workshop is a great way to break into art quilting. A class is for beginner quilters as well as those with experience. Tina Marie insists this is a *no rules* class.

Supply List:

Pictures: A photo or magazine image (or multiples) of a place. This is an abstract class. Doing a landscape, buildings, boats or anything inanimate is much "safer." We can discuss the pros and cons of your choices.

Glue Stick (water soluble)

Portable design board — foam core works fine! 1 yard of Warm and Natural®

Glass head pins or appliqué pins — **non-melting**

1 yard of Iron on Fusible webbing: Wonder Under®; Steam-a-Seam® or Misty Fuse® Various fat quarters for picture background

Scraps from 2" and up

Fabrics — sheers, silks, etc. — they all work (18" x 22" and smaller is fine for this)

Nymo beading thread or Silamide thread

Beading needle or 12 betweens

Any other embellishments to add

Threads (to match your fabrics)

Hand sewing needles (sharps and betweens are fine)

Iron and small ironing board if you can Pen and paper for notes Small hand scissors Small rotary cutter mat Rotary cutter Quilting ruler

FABRIC NOTE: Stick with fabrics you can see in the picture. To take it up a notch, choose fabrics with NOTHING to do with the picture — line is greater than color. If your photo has a good line (let's say buildings) you have a strong start and colors will just fit beautifully! It is better to avoid calicos or novelty prints, but feel free to bring some to experiment with.

There will be no workshops in January, March and April.
