AFRICAN FOLKLORE EMBROIDERY

African Folklore Embroidery is quickly growing to become one of our country's most popular cultural and artistic endeavors. The extreme contrasts of brightly colored threads against the black fabric make any completed design both striking and beautiful. **Leora Raikin,** owner of the Los Angeles company **African Folklore Embroidery** is our guest speaker at this month's guild meeting. Leora is a South African native, and was taught this creative and multi cultural needlecraft by her mother.

"African Folklore Embroidery is my hobby and passion," says Leora. "I love stitching, I love using colors and I take a great sense of pride in each design completed by one of my students. No two completed kit designs ever look the same!" Leora continues, "African Folklore Embroidery is a big part of our family culture, my mother, aunts, cousins, sister, sister-in-law and even my five year old son, have completed an African Folklore Embroidery design. We love sitting and stitching together."

Leora, a folklore embroidery artist, lecturer and teacher, has taught at museums, schools, guild workshops, private classes, art camps, summer camps and countless classes and organizations. She encourages her students to "think outside the box," to let their imagination run wild and to imagine that their needle is a paintbrush and the threads are their paints.

Inspired by the Ndebele women who are famous for their beautiful and colorful handcrafted work, and by African wildlife, African Folklore Embroidery is colorful, creative, fun and easy to do. Lenora Raikin, originally of South Africa, now a California resident, brings a wealth

of information on the culture and myths of Africa. African Folklore Embroidery is for those who *love* needle crafts, quilting, fiber arts, stitching, color and creativity — even beginners are stunned by their results! Quilters experience Africa by learning about the history and culture of the Ndebele Tribe in South Africa. Using colorful African threads and beads against a black background, students embroider images of Ndebele life as they learn about the lifestyle and customs of this fascinating culture and community. Develop new skills, expand your world, be creative and have fun in a colorful exciting environment.

Stitching techniques for completing an African Folklore Embroidery design including 3a chain stitch, 3b Satin Stitch, 3c French knots, and 3d Bullion stitch.

Embellishment techniques: Use of color, variegated threads and metallic thread for enhancement and effect

Beadwork techniques: Playing with threads, fiber and color, mixing fibers, threads and metallic

Enhancement and visual art techniques: Creating fiber art out of African Folklore Embroidery — cutting and stitching of different fabric onto the design. Completed kit designs can be made into quilts, purses, pillows, wall-hangings and more.

WORKSHOP SUPPLIES: The kit for this class includes everything necessary except a pair of scissors.

QUILTER OF THE MONTH

Karen Griska is a passionate and prolific quilt artist who made her first quilt at age 13, a charming one-patch. A self-taught quilter, she has now made well over 200 quilts, all original designs. Karen is inspired by antique quilts, particularly those pictured in the state quilt survey books, which she studies avidly. Her favorites are dynamic interpretations of traditional quilts. She loves quilts with quirky, improvisational elements and huge numbers of pieces and different fabrics.

Her favorite part of the quilt making process is creating the design. Karen does not usually sketch a plan in advance, but prefers to develop the design as she works. She loves to be astonished by the surprising twists and turns that occur during the process. Her new book, *Quilts from the Selvage Edge* is published by the American Quilter's Society, June 2008. 2009 Empire Quilters *Urban Inspirations* Show Information

A complete package of information with additional details about quilt submissions, categories, prizes, etc. will be presented to members at the September 13, 2008 meeting.

When: on the weekend of March 21-22, 2009 with set-up on Friday, March 20.

Where: The show will be held at FIT - at Reeves Great Hall (same as in 2007), on 28th street, near 7th Avenue.

Admission to show: \$10 for 1 day and \$18 for 2 days; \$8 for 1 day and \$15 for 2 days for seniors 65 and older and for students with student ID. Children under 12 are free. We will provide a special discounted entry fee for groups from other Guilds or organizations that prepay for entry.

Who may submit entries: Empire Quilters members who are members in good standing by the January 2009 meeting.

Each member who submits a quilt is required to volunteer a minimum of 4 hours to activities immediately preceding (within 1 month of the show), or during the show.

Judging: Entries will be judged by highly experienced judges Sandra L. Dorrbecker and Mary Walter. Both judges are accredited by the National Quilting Association. **Quilts do not have to be judged to be hung in the show.**

Judging

The judging will be completed prior to the quilts being hung. Members who want to have their quilts judged must present their quilts for judging at the March 7, 2009 monthly meeting.

Judging for this show will be on a 'points' system and ribbons will be awarded according to judging scores.

Except for crazy quilts and 'art' quilts for which tying is part of the artistic statement, tied quilts and comforters do not qualify to be in the show.

Quilts that are quilted by a professional quilter will not qualify for Best of Show ribbon or for Best Quilting ribbons.

Submitting

Fee: \$20, non-refundable; it is \$20 whether you submit one or two guilts

Members can submit up to 2 quilts that were made at any time, as long as the quilts have not appeared in previous Empire Quilters quilt shows. The quilter should specify preference for which to hang if only one can be hung due to space limitation

Each member may also submit one President's Challenge Quilt (see details in May 2007 newsletter or September package)

Any quilt submitted must not exceed 93 inches wide by 100 inches high (roughly queen sized).

Submission categories:

- 1. Hand quilted: pieced, appliqué, mixed, pictorial
- 2. (Self) Machine quilted: pieced, appliqué, mixed, pictorial
- 3. Professionally quilted: pieced, appliqué, mixed, pictorial
- Other Techniques including, but not limited to, yo-yo quilts, fabric manipulations, whole cloth, cathedral windows, painted cloth, crazy patchwork, nontraditional fused appliqué
- 5. Group quilts including, but not limited to, round robin quilts, quilts made by one person and quilted by another. To be eligible for a prize all work must be done by members of the Empire Quilters Guild. All members of the Group must be named on the submission form
- 6. President's Quilt Challenge

Size of quilts:

Large quilts: 60-93" by 80-100" Group quilts: up to 93" by 100"

Small quilts: 25-60" by 25-80" Other techniques: up to 93" by 100"

Miniature quilts: 24" by 24"

"Broadway Jane" Raffle Quilt Tickets

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



