Hanging with Luke Haynes by Earamichia Brown

I must say, I am a pretty lucky gal. I have the pleasure of meeting and getting to know some of the coolest quilters. I happened to be at a birthday lunch last month, and was hanging with Luke Haynes. While we were all eating and laughing, I remembered that he has an exhibit that just opened called "The American Context", and thought it would be great to tell you all a bit about him.

I was first introduced to him last August during the American Alliance of Quilters "Quilters take Manhattan" event. I was amazed at his work from the start. It had a bit of a Andy Warhol meets Urban Culture in fabric. A really cool, "contemporary" quilter that pushes the envelope.

Luke is a graduate of Cooper Union. School of Architecture in New York with the objective of "blurring the distinction between function and art and altering the way objects are perceived". For the past ten years, Luke has been exhibiting his work across the country from Washington to New York and a number of states in between. The press has called him and his work all things from "Not your typical artist", "The Cutting (& Stitching) Edge", to "Fabulous modern Quilter" and the "cutting edge of quilting art".

Luke's introduction to quilting began with a chance encounter with a box of fabric remnants, which sparked the beginning of his quilting journey. His first quilt measured 7 feet by 10 feet. Over the past ten years he has expanded and developed his technique. Through his most recent works, Luke has been investigating nostalgia and function through his art quilts. Luke says, "I work with quilts because they embody these [nostalgia and

function] subconsciously while lending a unique materiality to the process and resultant product. I can work with disparate pieces of fabric and create a cohesive final product that is greater than the sum of its parts."

Luke's current show is about American art, quilting, iconography and his own experience of each. Luke has been working for 10 years to understand and implement quilts as fine art. Luke says this will be a show of images he has grown up with as the foundation of American Art meshed with the ideas of quilting he has been working with. It will be a collision of the pieces of his work and history; a collision of what is deemed "fine art" and what is deemed "craft". Luke says that

his intention is to work on elevating the response to quilting in the public eye to one of more merit within the world of exhibiting art and fine object making.

He is taking known iconography and making quilts of it in his own way so its a re-contextualizing of the imagery through the use of fabrics and quilting techniques, thereby, giving the viewer a visual entry point while allowing them to understand quilting and textile art more.

"The American Context" will run from the 23rd of March till the 30th of April with the opening on April 13th at Eli Alexander Gallery Located 15 East 27th Street New York, NY 10016.

"The Boss Thanks You" 84 " by 120" This is a commission for the Bill and Melinda Gates foundation building that just opened up downtown Seattle. The girl in the main they call "the boss" and use her image as a figurehead for what they do.





"The Throne" 90" X 90" This piece is constructed from reclaimed textiles. Luke says, "I took Clothes and sheets discarded from the people of NY and created this quilt. The quilt is an image of both Kanye and Jay-Z. I used an Image by Troy Gua for the design. The colors are White: Sheets Blue: Jeans Black: Dress Clothes It then reads like a rags to riches story. It has been quilted in metallic thread so that when you are close it shines to speak to its subject matter in a tactile and visual way. There are 1 million quilting stitches on it. [My machine counted, is the only reason I know] I am standing there to give you scale."

The Antonio Ratti Textile Center by Mindy Wexler-Marks

The trip to the Antonio Ratti Textile Study Center went very well. This is a very special facility for the storage and study of all the textiles in the Metropolitan Museum collection. Maggi Gordon selected six quilted articles from the collection which were displayed on long tables specifically for us. They included a Japanese kimono with sashiko stitching, a crazy quilt and several quilts representing different historical periods and traditional styles. We were a large group so while one half was learning about the storage, the other was studying the selected items and then we reversed this process. Comments were very positive and I urge all members to examine the Antonio Ratti website. If you find an item in which you are interested and give them notice, they will arrange for you to view it. Also, they have an amazing library and this facility is available to the public at no charge. Anyone interested in fabric and quilts should acquaint themselves with this facility. It has much to offer.
