## Empire Quilters Block of the Month June, 2022 SIMPLIFIED LOG CABIN

This $10^{\prime \prime}$ block can be used instead of a log cabin block in traditional settings giving a very similar appearance to the quilt in a sharply decreased piecing time. It is made from a variety of pieces cut from $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ scraps, such as pieces of left-over binding.

Cut a total of 9 pieces as follows:
A total of 5 pieces from different dark fabrics all $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ wide by $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}, 4 \frac{1}{2},{ }^{\prime \prime} 61 / 2^{\prime \prime}, 8 \frac{1}{2} 2^{\prime \prime}, 101 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ long and $A$ total of 4 pieces from different light fabrics all $2 \frac{1}{2 \prime \prime}$ wide by $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}, 4 \frac{1}{2},{ }^{\prime \prime} 6 \frac{1}{2}{ }^{\prime \prime}, 8 \frac{1122^{\prime \prime}}{}$ long.

Sew the strips together into the block in the numerical order shown below:

(If you are a person who feels that to look like a log cabin block there must be a red "fire" square in the block, replace the dark $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ by $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece with a red piece, but not for this block of the month entry.)

This design was shown in the Keepsake Quilting mail catalogue as a quilt kit Espresso Road designed by Bonnie Sullivan. The assembly of the block was simplified removing four piecing steps per block.
