This months program is "Working in a Series" with internationally known, award winning quilt artist, Carol Taylor. Carol has won five "Best of Show" awards in her career with five different quilts. She has created more than 450 guilts since she began guilting in 1993. In May, 2001, the Museum of Art and Design in New York acquired her quilt "Reverberations" for their permanent collection and "Six Continents of Quilts" exhibition. Her work was also selected for the Smithsonian's "Following the Thread" exhibit in 2002. Her quilt "Cymbalism" was one of fifteen selected for the Museum of American Folk Art's exhibition which toured from 2001 - 2003. Carol has won many awards at quilt shows

over the years, and an amazing 21 major prizes in 2005, 17 in 2004, and 10 in 2003.

Carol is an elementary school teacher by degree and a sales recruiter for 22 years. She closed her business in October, 2003 to become a full time quilter. Her art quilts grace the walls of several companies as well as private collectors.

Carol loves color and is obsessed with quilting. She loves to spend time in her studio playing with fabrics, threads and designs. This month's program promises to be very exciting and inspirational. Arc-I-Texture Quilt with Carol Taylor Cost: \$65.00 Paid by November 9th Date: Sunday, November 20, 2005 Time: 9:30A.M. – 4:00 P.M. Place: 343 8th Avenue, NYC

Carol Taylor has been a making a name for herself in quilting circles with her imaginative and wonderfully colorful geometric award winners. She will be teaching her favorite class on how to mix shapes and shades and finish them with surface action that raises the level of visual enjoyment. Carol wants you to bring your fabrics, including textured fabrics—upholstery, homespuns, etc already fused in small units, 10" to 12" square. So the only big items to bring are a sewing machine and iron. Those who want to expand quilting horizons, sign up. <u>ARC-I-TEXTURE SUPPLY LIST:</u> (Carol Taylor) Long version on the Web. <u>www.Empirequilters.net</u>. workshop page. Also go to <u>www.CarolTaylorQuilts.com</u> to see pictures of Carol's Arc-I-Texture quilts. Go to Teaching Info page.

- Sewing machine: including all feet plus couching or braiding or piping foot (Bernina's #21). Several bobbins, extension cord. 90/14 machine needles (bring extra). Bring your manual if you are not sure about machine set up for these feet.
- Basic sewing supplies: scissors, pins, hand needles (sharps), thread for binding, seam ripper. Basting spray such as 505 (this is an indoor workshop, be sure your spray is nontoxic).
- Pressing: Bring an iron and small pressing pad. You will want your own.

Also bring a pressing cloth for any delicate fabrics or yarns you apply.

- Fusible web: 1-2 yards regular Wonder Under® or Transweb®. <u>DO NOT</u> bring heat and bond. It is too heavy for this project. **BEFORE CLASS**, iron fusible web to each of 7-10 color coordinated fabrics you plan to use. **THIS MUST BE DONE AT HOME.** Bring extra fusible to class with extra fabrics in case you want to add a new fabric you weren't sure about using.
- Fabrics: Texture is the focus. Choose 7

 10 different fabrics (light, medium, dark, some textured) which coordinate color wise. You won't need much of any one fabric for your 15x 15 piece. Bring extra fabric so you can play.
- Trims: Any chenille or fancy yarn (stay) away from eye lash yarns as they will get caught in thread when couching), ribbon floss or wide thread to couch down for the "arcs" (circles). BRING 2 **KINDS CONTINUOUS** IN **LENGTHS**: Thinner to match or blend with your fabrics for all "seams" and raw edges. Black or a subtle multicolor, nubby or smooth, works well. Heavier for the circles that go on top of everything. Multicolored yarns work well for contrast. Chenille is the most forgiving and the easiest.
- Thread: Invisible or fancy rayon thread for couching. YLI® clear invisible thread allows couched yarn to "star". Also matching thread for binding.
- Backing /Base/Batting: (a) A 16" x 16" WASHED muslin, solid black or white base fabric. (b) A 17" x 17" backing fabric. (c) A 17" x 17" spray basted batting already ironed onto your backing. (d) To try my method of "facing" instead of binding, cut six 3" x 18" strips of backing fabric. I will demo how to bind so it doesn't show.
 (e) A practice sandwich, 15" x 15", spray basted together to test couching the binding as a facing technique.

I think that there'll be lots of fun and hopefully many happy quilters at the end of the day. And, don't forget there will be games of chance – we can all let loose and feel like children again, as we toss spools to win fat quarters of fabric. QUILTER OF THE MONTH

PAT DECKER

In my non-quilting life, I am a graphic designer. For many years, most of my work was black & white advertising print design. I think that explains my enthusiasm for very colorful quilts. My first quilt, in 1979, was a totally non-traditional design. It was an alphabet and animals baby quilt painted on muslin with machine-stitched outlines. Not knowing a thing about fabric paints, it was stiff from acrylic paint and definately meant to be a wall quilt. (Otherwise it probably would have crushed the recipient). I retired from quilting for a few years until I was given Beth Gutcheon's book, "The Perfect Patchwork Primer". (Most of the books in the early eighties were black and white and not particularly inspiring.) I was also under the impression that one needed a quilting frame in order to quilt. For a long time, I felt you needed

to have a reason to make a quilt. (like a wedding, baby shower, Christmas) How foolish. When I discovered "quilt as you go", I went! In the past 20 years I have probably produced close to 200 quilts and unfinished tops. The designing, planning and piecing are my favorite activities. The quilting is not. I am a dedicated "scrap" quilter - I have found very few fabrics (even the downright uglies) - that can't find a place in one of my quilts. I also learn everything the hard way. My seam-ripper is a faithful companion. I've been a member of Empire since 1995, the Long Island Quilters Guild since 2001 and prior to moving into Manhattan, I belonged to the Eastern Long Island Quilters Guild. Can't say I'll ever be an expert at any phase of the process, but I sure do enjoy trying.


"New York Beauty Raffle Quilt Block" (3:30 pm – 5:00 pm)







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Empire Quilt Guild Holiday Fundraiser Bazaar December 10th

This year's fundraiser will be a "fun"-raiser. It will not be as elaborate a production as prior year's but will still give everyone a chance to get together, socialize, bid/buy a few tickets to win some great items, and try your hand at a couple games of chance. This meeting will open to guests (no guest fee) but admission will be a donation of a raffle item (see below) -- even if it is just one piece of fabric. Bring along a project to work on while the afternoon activities take place.

So, First – the ask/plea. We would like EQG members to donate <u>Something</u> towards the fundraiser. Ideally it is something useful and of value that you have on hand and wouldn't mind donating it to the Guild. We will then bundle it with a few other items to make a unique "package" to raffle off. We'd like you to consider "re-gifting" something you might have received and know that you will never use, or perhaps some new quilting supplies or notions where you have extra on hand. Now is the time to look in your closet for that gift your received two years ago that has not made it out of the box. For this event we'd like to take a "pass" on finished quilts or craft projects (unless you have a superb piece of work!) or "flea market" items. You can hold onto them for a meeting later in the year. For this December event we would like to receive more "upscale" donations – sorry in advance, no offense intended, but "no junk". The event is essentially a four-patch:
