Helen is one of the top experts in our field. She has developed a tried-and-true quilting philosophy — which she generously shares with quilters around the world. Helen has a talent for educating quilters in an entertaining and light-hearted manner. We're looking forward to her presentation, and hope you will join us.

Our show is coming soon. Do you want an expert eye to advise on the quilting design for your entry quilt? Or do you have "unfinished objects" waiting a final decision? This is a must take workshop if you hesitate before starting to quilt. Discover what types of quilting patterns are appropriate for patchwork and for appliqué tops. Learn how easy it is to make any quilting pattern fit your quilt. Helen Squire offers her suggestions both for hand and machine quilting and will discuss good work habit and easier design steps for creating your own quilting patterns. Bring an unfinished quilt top for classroom discussion.

#### SUPPLIES

Students will be provided with the quilting design booklet. No other small supplies are required. A small stapler and paper scissors are optional items briefly used in class.

#### VERMONT QUILT FESTIVAL TRIP BY SYLVIA HUGHES

About thirty of us left early in the morning of Saturday, June 28 on the way to our over night trip to the Vermont Quilt Festival. Empire members were joined by friends and a very special guest, Shirley Lodington. Shirley is a quilt maker from Melbourne Australia who was vacationing in the States with her husband and kids. She heard about our trip and went along with us before joining her family in Washington, DC on Sunday night.

It was a long trip, but there were enough empty seats that we could move around. Our efficient tour leader Aleeda Crawley, brought along quilt books and magazines to borrow and Shirley brought Australian magazines for us to see. She actually donated one of the books to our Library and gave each member on the trip a needle holder made with Australian fabric. We each gave Shirley a fat quarter.

When we arrived at our hotel, our rooms were not ready so we just went right on to the Quilt Festival. It's their 32nd annual show, actually the oldest and largest quilt event in New England. There were about 250 quilts exhibited and over 220 invitationals including antique quilts, teacher's showcase quilts, and what I enjoyed the most a retrospective of Ann Bird's work, a Canadian who has been quilting for 40 years. Her work included many beautiful six- or eight-pointed stars. Of course there were vendors, and the day was full. Kitty Squire, Anna Krassy and I had dinner with Shirley, choosing to eat at Friendly's so we were able to plan dessert first.

After breakfast on Sunday, we got on the bus and headed for the Shelburne Museum where we spent the rest of the day. Among the many exhibits at the Shelburne (the grounds include 29 buildings, of which 20 are historic), there were many magnificent 19th century American quilts; a small but incredible contemporary quilts "Quilts in Bloom: A Bouquet of Textile Art" — that included a Velda Newman piece. Kitty and I also loved the Mary Cassatt exhibition and saw some wonderful European and American Dolls. What was best was that everyone on the trip was able to zero in on whatever part of the Shelburne interested them. So soon we were on our way to New York, in time for Shirley to catch her train at Penn Station. By the way, I have Shirley's email address, if anyone wants to keep in touch with her. And even if you weren't on the trip, Shirley is always looking for new chocolate chip cookie recipes. Finally, thanks Aleeda for making these trips possible. Sylvia Hughes

#### THE ROAD TO LOWELL BY RITA REID

We arrived at Keepsake Quilting on Saturday afternoon and a shopping frenzy ensued. We had at least two hours of shopping delight which was hardly enough for me. There were fabrics galore and lots of books, magazines and notions, so every shopper had a chance to purchase *something*. As a bonus, Keepsake Quilting also gave each of us a free package of fat quarters. I even managed to go to the yarn shop and at least one other area store. We retired to the Marriot Courtyard in Nashua, NH, where we rested for the day ahead at the Lowell (MA) Quilt Festival. On Sunday, we started out early and arrived at the Tsongas Arena before the 10 a.m. opening. My group chose to walk over to the New England Quilt Museum where we also waited for the 10 a.m. opening. I had been to the museum last year, so I was familiar with the layout. I went upstairs to view the quilts and went into its vast quilt library. The library will mail books to members and will also give you a tax receipt for donations of your used books and magazines. In addition to visiting the library there is a store, which had many many books, magazines, patterns and quilt-related items for sale. I quickly perused quite a few of the offerings, and bought a couple of books.

We walked down the block to the Lowell National Historical Park which has a museum and store. After stopping to eat at a local restaurant, we returned to the Tsongas Arena around 12:30, leaving us about two hours to view hundreds of quilts and dozens of vendors. We accepted the challenge with glee. The quilts were marvelous, of course. I got many new ideas and took lots of pictures to refresh my memory after I got home. I supported as many of the vendors as I could, and I only stopped buying fabric because I didn't know how I would get it home. By 2:30, we were on the bus, and a few minutes later, we began our trip home. The monotony of the long bus trip was broken by the very challenging games (with prizes) that Aleeda provided. This was more fun than my trip to Aruba last month. I can hardly wait for the trip next year, (which should be longer!).

#### Fall Foliage Trip

On Saturday, October 4, we will head up to Schenectady, NY for the QUILTS (Quilters United in Learning Together, Schenectady) show. This show features a raffle quilt, vendors, and door prizes, but I think the main event will be the fall colors on display. QUILTS is presenting its 2008 Autumn Inspirations XI show at Proctor's GE Theater. Tickets for the trip, including tolls, tip and admission to the show are \$55 and must be paid for at the September meeting

#### **Upcoming Trips**

In addition to the fall foliage trip, I am planning a President's Day Weekend retreat. One possible location is the Hudson River Valley Art Workshops (artworkshops.com). The cost will likely be about \$350 for a Friday-Monday including a wine and cheese reception on Friday evening, continental breakfast and chef-prepared dinner nightly, and a cookie break. Simple lunches (sandwiches, salads) can be ordered (the chef will be busy cooking our gourmet dinner!). There are a **limited** (*less than 25*) **number of spaces**, and Empire members on the list will have priority. If you haven't signed up, please do; reservations will then be on a first-paid basis. I am looking for other retreat options as well. While I have considered Chicago, the weather is just a little too unpredictable to trust to a bus ride, so I am now investigating a bus trip to Paducah, April 22-25, 2009. Many hotels require a minimum 3 or 4 night stay. Winterthur and the Smithsonian National Museum of American History are also possibilities for this year, including our usual show trips. #### **GUILD YAHOO! GROUP**

Welcome back everyone – and a hearty welcome to our many new members! If you haven't yet joined the guild's Yahoo online group, now is a good time. The guild Yahoo group is our "communications central" between guild meetings. News items are posted on the Yahoo group when time is of the essence.

There are many benefits of a Yahoo group. Topping that list is the ability for guild members to post messages directly. So if you need advice on a quilting project – ask the group! You're certain to find help from fellow members. Or if you know of a quilting exhibit (or fabric sale!) and you want to share those news tidbits with fellow members – it's as easy as writing an email. Members can also post pictures to the group, so you can show off that finished project before shipping it to your grandchild, or get advice on what sort of border should go on your almost-finished quilt. Some members use the group to highlight an interesting quilting class, or to request quilts for special causes, or for help in locating a particular fabric or gizmo.

The guild periodically receives requests for quilting teachers, and for quilters for a quilting job. We post those requests on the Yahoo group. So if you are interested in some extra income, you will hear about those opportunities through the Yahoo group.

In order to join the group, you need to be a member of Empire Quilters, and you need to have a Yahoo ID. If you already have a Yahoo ID, here's how to join the Yahoo! group:

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

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


