Empire Quilters has, in the over 28 years of being a guild made thousands of quilts without knowing who the recipients were. A recent exception was the Veterans Quilt Project; many of us had tears in our eyes as they were graciously accepted. It was a satisfying experience for us all.

Although our By-laws do not require each member to make one quilt for charity each year, we are all STRONGLY encouraged to do so. Sadly this is not happening. On Charity Saturday there were quilts galore. Watching as people sew, tied and participated in some form of the process it was wonderful to see. People appeared to be having fun, and I saw some beautiful quilts being worked on. Our goal was 200 for the day; the last number I heard was about 160. Yes, it was a rainy miserable day. I THANK all of you who showed up. Presently we have almost 400 members. Where were their quilts? I know we will get some more quilts next month. I also THANK the many of you who make several quilts each month. I look forward to increased participation next year.

We have a lot coming up in the next few months. The preparation for the 2011 show is in progress. The incredible Subway Series Quilt is being worked on by Mary Cargill and her group of hand quilters. The dedication of this group is outstanding.

Additionally we have Betty Pillsbury to tantalize the Crazy Quilters, and leave the rest of us thinking "maybe I could do that."

Three years ago, we raised the dues in order to help off set a significant raise in our rent. Fortunately we have been able to hold the dues as there are, for a significant period of time. Regrettably this is no longer possible. The Board is looking at the smallest raise in dues, without having to come back at a later time to ask for more money.

It is never easy to ask for more money; however I think we offer you some of the finest programs and workshops available. We have a library that is available to all members, focus groups and member workshops. There is something here for all-just ask.

She is perhaps best known as one of the foremost experts in Crazy Quilting and embellishments. She is the recipient of almost 200 awards for her pieces, and was the recipient of the Embroiderer's Guild of America Educator's Award of Excellence. Betty has written articles for many publications, and has lectured and taught all over the country.

QUILTS FOR RESCUED CATS, KITTENS AND PUPPIES

Diane Rubenstein will be collecting these much needed mini-mini quilts at April meeting. Going forward a good size would be approximately 22 x 15", but any already made a different size will be fine. Please make these as simple as possible - no binding is needed. Finish off as we do the charity quilts by turning right side out with batting inside and close up seam. A little quilting is needed.

Spring time is when there is an influx of kittens and the shelters are overflowing with animals that have been brought in due to the financial situation of many people. I know our work is needed for all the people going through hard times and cats & pups take a back seat, however, these do not take long to make or require a lot of fabric.

Your help is needed and greatly appreciated. Thank you for all of your help and kindness.

MEMBERSHIP DUES UPDATE

In May we will begin accepting renewals for membership. As we all know, every year the cost of everything rises. Our rent has increased 210% since the last time we raised our membership fees (from \$5000 in 2007 to \$15490 this year). When you think about all the benefits of membership-the programs, workshops, focus groups, trips, blocks of the month, and our bi-annual show-it is the best deal in town! We have been the lucky recipient of a \$10,000 anonymous grant for the last 3 years that has been used to cover the costs of all our programs. We will fortunately be receiving it again next year.

This year our dues did not cover our rental costs. Therefore, we are going to be forced to increase them for next year. The amount will be determined by the Board and voted on in April. In addition, we are discussing the possibility of charging an additional \$5.00 for mailing the newsletter-this would cover the cost of the postage only.

The Value of an EQ Membership

Empire Quilters was founded in 1982 by a group of women who wanted to meet to work on quilts together and educate their members on what quilting is all about. It has evolved over its 28 year existence to be a registered non-profit organization that is dedicated in preserving and promoting the tradition, culture and history of quiltmaking and to foster good fellowship among persons interested in the art of quilting in New York. However, you might ask yourself exactly what does that mean- it sounds great, but what's in it for me?

This year alone, we have had lectures and workshops from David Taylor, Gwyned Trefethen, Sherry Shine, and Sharon Schamber-all noted quilt artists. Coming up, we have Betty Pillsbury talking about "Why I am a Crazy Quilter", Trish Chambers educating us on "The Legend of Freedom Quilts and the Underground Railroad" and Judith Larzelere on "Making Color Strips Sing". All of these speakers have been paid for by a grant from an anonymous donor, who has enabled our Guild to bring in all of these internationally known quilters at no cost to the Guild. Our program chair, Mary Butler is always looking for suggestions for speakers as well as for comments about the current program. Starting in April, there will be a suggestion box at the tables out front as well as paper at each table. We encourage you to give us your comments and suggestions for future programs.

Also this year, we have had an extremely successful program of member led workshop/demonstrations. This program was so successful, we will be repeating a form of it next year, so be sure to let us know what workshop/demos you would like to have included next year-a good thing for you to put in the suggestion box.

Each month, Janet Randolph ensures that our members who are early birds can enjoy focus groups that teach everything from Crazy Quilting to Ruched Flowers to Charity Quilts to Redwork to Double Miter Binding to Beaded Spiders. We also have an ongoing Elm Creek Quilt Sampler club that meets after the focus groups. Either of these are a wonderful way to meet and enjoy the company of your fellow Empire members.

As a charitable organization, one of the most important functions of Empire is supporting our community with our art. At Christmas, we focus on stockings and stuffed animals, etc to give to a shelter for abused or at-risk women and children. This last December, our members donated close to 300 stockings and 238 bears as well as a huge number of toiletries, earrings and other items. Each year, we also spend an entire day making quilts to be donated to various hospitals, shelters and other charitable organizations in New York. This year, despite the pouring rain, 75 to 80 incredibly dedicated members spent a wonderful day finishing over 120 quilts. In addition there were many other unfinished tops that were taken home to be returned at a later meeting. Charity day is one of the best days of the year for working together, talking together and most importantly, laughing together while doing something that we all love. Although our By-laws do not require each member to make one quilt for charity each year, we are all STRONGLY encouraged to do so. If each of us just made one quilt each year, we would have 374 quilts to donate. As terrific a number as 120 finished quilts is, 374 would be better!

Every two years, Empire Quilters likes to brag a little by putting on a show. In 2009, we hung about 215 quilts to show off to our approximately 2000 visitors. We showcased quilts made by our extremely talented membership ranging from crazy quilts to art quilts and including every type of quilt between. We are in the midst of planning our 2011 show. We expect it to be just as gorgeous and successful.

As you can see, for our members, Empire Quilters truly does fulfill its mission.

FLOWERS FOR SYLVIA

A few years ago, Sylvia Zeveloff, a former Guild President, stood up at a meeting and offered a flower block of the month project to anyone who wanted it. I wanted to do some hand appliqué so I took the project from her. When I got home and opened it, I found it was not appliqué but piecing, some of it very intricate. I told Sylvia, when I took it from her that I wouldn't be able to start on it until the following Fall, and that I would donate the quilt to raise money for charity when it was completed.

It took a bit longer for me to start the project than I wanted and Sylvia asked about it at a meeting. I told her I would definitely get to it. I did start piecing some of the easier blocks but left some of the more difficult ones for later. Eventually I got them all done. In the meantime, Sylvia had become ill. I wasn't aware of her illness and when she came to a Guild meeting with a health aide, I became determined to finish the blocks quickly. I brought them to a Guild meeting a few months later to show her and learned that she had passed away. I told the Guild I would put the quilt together and quilt it.



I brought the quilt to our March meeting, and the Board has decided to

hold a special raffle of the quilt; the proceeds will go to the Guild. The quilt is machine pieced with some appliqué and hand quilted. --Diane Paul
