Everything I Wanted to Know About This Guild, But Didn't' Ask, by Earamichia Brown

This issue of the newsletter will focus on all the things we should know about our guild. This information is necessary and informative to new members and seasoned members alike. How many of you read the bylaws recently? Or, asked to join one of the Guild's committee's recently. Every organization is only as good as the participation of its members. There are many ways that you can contribute to this guild. In turn, there are many things that this great Empire Guild offers you. So lets, delve into the many things that we may have forgotten or never even realized was available.

Lets look at our Standing Committees. (For more detailed information please refer to the guild By Laws on the website.)

Focus Group Chair: Arranges instruction of various techniques of quilting by members for members without charge at monthly meetings. *Here is an opportunity for you to learn something new or teach others.*

Historian/Archivist Chair: Maintains a complete file of the Newsletters of the Guild.

Hospitality/NQA Chapter Coordinator: Ensures that guests and new members are introduced to the membership, seated with a group at the meeting and generally offer the Guild's hospitality so that they feel comfortable and welcome. The Chair will give the New Member's Handbook to all new members. They also, upon notification of major events in a member's life, send a suitable card on behalf of the Guild.

Librarian Chair: Acquires books and videos on quilting, by donation or purchase, to provide informational materials for use of members and make such materials available at monthly meetings. This is a great member benefit. If any of you are like me, I have way too many books as it is, so I will be sure to use this.

Membership Chair: Maintains the membership roster, record all changes of names, addresses and telephone numbers and coordinates the payment of dues with the Treasurer.

Newsletter Chair Editor: Edits and arrange the publication and distribution of a newsletter from the Guild every month from September through June containing announc-

ements of the next meeting and any other information of interest to the Guild. Information for the newsletter is to be submitted by the membership to the Newsletter Editor. This is where I need YOUR help. If you have items of interest to other members such as articles, poetry, or photographs, please feel free to submit something to be included in the next newsletter

Program Chair: Arranges to have lecturers, classes and other forms of activities at monthly meetings.

Service Projects Chair: Coordinates the Guild's charity projects which include preparing quilt tops and toys for distribution to various hospitals, nursing homes, and hospices chosen by the membership. *Here is an excellent way to get to know other members.*

Share Table Chair: Coordinates the sale of fabric remnants and presents collected fees to the Treasurer. This is one of my favorite parts of the meeting. You have a chance to take home great fabric at a fraction of the cost.

Show Chair: Plans and executes all aspects of the biannual quilt show.

Show and Tell Chair: Coordinates and announces the presentation of quilt works by participating members at the monthly meetings. *This is where you get to show your stuff.*

Trips Chair: Seeks out and locates quilt outings and coordinates all aspects of transportation, admissions, accommodations (if necessary), and arranges publicity for the event. Let us know where you want to go.

Ways and Means Chair: Raises funds through flea markets and other fund raisers to augment the Treasury.

Website Chair: Maintains the website, making sure that all the latest information about the Guild is included on it.

Workshop Chair: Arranges workshops in conjunction with the Program Chair. This is one of the best benefits of membership. You get to attend workshops with renowned quilters at mere pennies on the dollar, and sometimes for nothing at all.



First Road Trip: Pennsylvania National Quilt Show.

Imost 40 members went to the Pennsylvania quilt show. We walked and we walked and we walked some more. We viewed over 600 quilts including a world quilt competition on tour with quilts from Australia, Canada, Germany, Israel, Japan, New Zealand South Africa and the United Kingdom. Of particular interest were the quilts by Linda S. Schmidt including several unbelievable items of wearable art.

Also amazing was an exhibit called "The Unspoken Truth About Color: A Dialogue in Art Quilts about Racism" exploring the most complex and seldom discussed, most problematic and insistent of all issues in our culture today. The number of vendors almost equaled the number of quilts and Empire quilt members had a field day shopping. We bought everything from fat quarters to a long arm sewing machine and everything in between. We are looking forward to our next trip in November.




Members Teaching Members

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
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An Empire Guild Meeting from Start to Finish.

ave you ever wondered what to do at a guild meeting. Follow these easy steps.

- Upon Arrival: If you are a registered member, you will find your name and address on the sign-in sheet at the Membership/Check-in table. Each member needs to sign in *before* finding a seat. At check-in time, if you have Show & Tell items, complete the Show & Tell form. The Membership/Check-in table is the place to ask questions don't be shy!
- Where Should I Sit: Take a look around, find a seat you like, and catch your breath.
- Now that You Have a Seat: Bring your donations to the Monthly Fundraiser, put your scraps, old patterns, etc. on the Scrap Table, shop with the Vendorof-the-Month, visit the Library and drop off magazine donations. Drop off your Block of the Month (BOM) at the space reserved for BOM's and fill out your name on a slip of paper for each block that you made. Buy your Monthly fundraising tickets. Visit the Charity Coach and Chat or Focus Group. Then, visit friends, make new ones, look around until the meeting begins.
- Meeting is Called to Order: 1:00 pm the President calls the meeting to order and takes up any and all issues concerning the business of running the guild.

- Guest Speaker Time: Usually after the business discussion, a Guest Speaker will demonstrate unique techniques, experiences and/or products.
- Show & Tell: Members present their completed works (usually quilts or quilted clothing), heirlooms, unique purchases or other items of interest.. You also get your pictures taken for the guild website.
- Block-of-the-Month: Display is noted and the winner-take-all drawing is held from among the participants.
- Raffle Prize Time: Now comes the last-minute scramble to purchase tickets before the drawing. Winning tickets are drawn until all items are distributed.
- **Scrap Table:** Opens after all other meeting features have ended. You can purchase scraps and patterns for as little as 25¢.
- At the End of Official Business: If afternoon focus groups are scheduled, attendees now divide into Focus Groups that continue until the end of the day (no later than 4:30 pm). However, you are free to use this time to quilt with friends, ask questions, and re-visit the Vendor-of-the-Month..

Now you are an Empire Guild Meeting Attendee Pro. Can't wait to see you in action at the next meeting.

Newark Museum: Patchwork from Folk Art to Fine Art

There is a new exhibit at the Newark Museum which opened on September 14th and will run through the end of the year. This exhibit tracks the evolution of quilts from functional women's folk art to self-conscious artworks intended for display. The exhibit contains about two dozen quilts, some created with powerful graphic designs pieced together from geometric patches of silk, wool or cotton, others with more complex narratives using folk art, appliqué and embroidery. Album quilts, commemorative quilts and crazy quilts—all of these were ways in which women built community and expressed their artistic skills. Contemporary studio quilters have also embraced the historic traditions of this craft, while creating a kind of quilt that has only existed since the late twentieth century.


Accompanying this exhibition is *The Global Art of Patchwork: Africa and Asia*, showcasing work of patchwork traditions outside the world of quilts, also drawn from the Museum's holdings.

Charity Coach and Chat

Thank you to all the Empire members who brought in donations to the September meeting. We received over 30 quilts—quilts for children and for preemies as well as lap quilts. We also received six wheelchair bags, six tops, and a dozen stuffed animals. It was great to have all of these contributions and the charities will be delighted to have them. In addition, we used them to show new quilters examples of what charity quilts might be like. Please keep them coming!

In October we will continue our charity quilt demonstrations. These demos will begin at 11:45. We had a good turnout in September. Please come join us to learn all the fun it can be to put together charity quilts! If you didn't make it to our first demo about half-square triangles, come seen us in October and catch up!

Judy Isaacs will show how to make the felt animals and Christmas stockings that we collect at our December meeting for distribution to children in the shelters we support, as we have done in prior years. Judy's demo will start at 12:15.

Some members have asked about the correct measurements for charity quilts. Marilyn Korn, after consulting with experienced charity quilt makers, came up with these measurements:

crib quilts 36" x 36" minimum, 42" x 42" maximum lap quilts 36" by no more than 48" twin bed quilts 72" by 90" preemie quilts 16" by 24"

[For preemie quilts ONLY: They must be hand quilted, not tied, no knots or buttons to irritate babies' sensitive skin. Pre-wash in Dreft or Ivory to remove harmful finishes on fabric]

October Block of the Month (BOM) - Staircase Block

ctober's block is the lovely staircase block. You can check out the blog for more detailed information.

Fabric Recipe: Use florals, dots, paisleys, etc. in multi colors (as shown below). Choose one dark-ish and one light-ish print. (Some low contrast blocks will be nice too.)

Directions:

- 1. Cut two strips, 3 inches wide. Sew them together length wise. Press.
- 2. Cut 5.5" lengths, as shown in the photo below. Arrange the blocks as shown in the next photo. Sew. Press.

That's it!



You may want to bring your scraps so the winner of the blocks will have some matching fabrics for a possible border.

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Ways and Means Committee, What is That? by Kitty Squire

ays and Means is responsible for raising money for the Guild through various fundraisers. Each year we sponsor 1 or 2 flea markets, usually in November and June. Members are invited to rent either small or large tables to sell their wares. It is a great way to either sell your crafts or to go through and clean out your stash, getting rid of the fabric and notions that you had to have then, but now wonder what you were thinking. Remember, one person's garbage is another's treasure!

In addition Ways and Means usually has some kind of fundraiser in December. This year we are requesting small quilts (96" or less in circumference) on holiday themes, remembering that here in New York, we celebrate holidays for everything and everyone. Steuben Day anyone? The bidding will start at \$20 per quilt and go from there. There will also be a bake sale for which we ask our members to bring in goodies, desserts, sandwiches, whatever they feel
